This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated <a href="Primary PE">Primary PE</a> and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.** 

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

#### Review of last year's spend and key achievements (2022/2023)

We recommend you start by reflecting on the impact of current provision and reviewing your previous spend.

Complete PE now embedded across key stages as a planning, progression and assessment tool.

Linked with local providers, such as Kendal College, Outward Bound, High Borrans and Windermere School, to give our children a broader range of O&A experiences, such as Langdale climbing/ghyll scrambling; kayaking at Fell Foot; Cathedral Quarry; residentials; Swallows & Amazons day aty Hodge How. Used our location on the edge of the Lake District to enhance the above.

Emphasis on encouraging our children to participate in external competitions, as well as hosting our own.

- Staff now have access to up-to-date planning, schemes of work demonstration videos, online training, progression documents, assessment info to help them in the delivery and assessment of PF
- Y5 and Y6 outdoor and adventurous residentials subsidized with SP to make them more affordable for our families. Y5 = 95% attendance rate; Y6 = 87%.
- Skilled providers risk assess and deliver outdoor and adventurous activities such as ghyll scrambling, kayaking and climbing in a setting that the children would otherwise not have access to.
- SEN/PP children given the chance in smaller groups – to have opportunities to participate in activities they may not otherwise get the chance to access.
- Many children experience competition for the first time in a new setting. Takes away fear of doing this again and can test themselves against other schools.
- Some events are designed to be inclusive, for those children who might normally not put themselves forward or be picked for an event/team. These children are treated as equals and get to share the experience.
- Raises the profile of the school if we attend –
   and are successful at as many of these events
   as possible.

Continue to use for 23-24, as the upfront cost already on purchase and only a nominal annual membership fee to

Continued for 23/24 due to large rises in costs of residential experiences, especially Outward Bound, Ullswater.

## **Swimming Data**

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	92% (4 children unable)	
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	85% (7 children unable)	Four children unable to swim 25m; another three could only swim 25m using one stroke.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	92%

Have you done this?	Yes	Some extra sessions in Spring 2 for 30 children who could not yet swim 25m. The vast majority were Y5, but some Y6 children successfully met the 25m standard during these sessions.
